Sacred Space

It is an important part of our ministry as Pastoral Home Care volunteers to spend time and attention on our own spiritual growth in order to accompany others in theirs.

A practical resource in this area is Sacred Space www.sacredspace.ie which is a website put together by the

Irish Jesuits, that facilitates taking a few moments for prayer while at your computer screen.

Each day you are given a certain theme to focus on. You are led through a six stage selection of prayer and scripture and the screen fades in transition between these

steps in a gentle way. It is very user friendly, even with a "Need Inspiration?" link that you can click on should you become "stuck".

It is a good way to connect with God in the midst of everyday activity and may be a helpful resource to some of those we visit who are 'online'

A theology of sickness and suffering


How the communion ritual works
